Page 1: The worked example

This resume belongs to a made-up eighth grader named Dev Okonkwo. **Dev is not a real person.** Every single line on this resume came from something this class actually does, which means you can write one just like it. As you read, circle the summary line and underline the output in three of the bullets.

Summary: Grade 8 student looking for summer work in a kitchen, a store, or a camp. I can follow a written plan under a time limit, handle money and prices, and work a station with a team of seven.

- Measuring dry, liquid, and small quantities accurately
- Reading and scaling a recipe, including unit conversions

EXPERIENCE

Station Manager, Class Meal for 30 People | Family and Consumer Sciences, Spring

- Led a station team of seven to cook and serve a pasta course for 30 people, running a written eight-block time plan, and got every plate down inside the 40-minute period.
- Scaled a recipe from 4 servings to 28, converted cups to fluid ounces to ounces by weight, rounded every line up to a package the store sells, and ran a yield check that cleared 30 portions.
- Priced 11 ingredients from a real weekly supermarket circular, found two store-brand swaps that saved \$3.40, and brought the station in at \$18.60 against a \$20.00 budget.
- Wrote a ten-step station card with an allergen box that another team followed with no questions on the first read.

Project: Feed a Family of Four on \$40.00 | Family and Consumer Sciences, Fall

- Planned three days of meals for a family of four for \$38.95, hitting all five MyPlate groups, using unit prices from a store circular.
- Cooked one dish from the plan in a lab and presented the menu and the math to the class.

Investor Challenge (classroom simulation) | Family and Consumer Sciences, Winter

- Managed a \$10,000 practice portfolio across six weeks, held through a simulated market drop instead of selling, rebalanced twice, and finished up 7 percent.
- Wrote a four-page Investor Report explaining every trade with a reason.

Family responsibilities | Ongoing



- Cook dinner for a family of five three nights a week, planning around a weekly grocery budget.
- Watch two younger siblings, ages 4 and 7, after school Monday through Thursday.

Volunteer, Neighborhood Food Pantry | Two Saturdays, Winter

- Sorted and shelved about 300 donated items by category and checked expiration dates.

- Youth group, weekly

- Best Numbers, FACS Shark Tank pitch day, grade 8
- Perfect station check record, seven of seven labs

LANGUAGES

Look at what this resume does that most first drafts do not:

1. It is **one page** and there are **no paragraphs**.
2. Every bullet has a **number** in it, or a named audience, or both.
3. The experience section leads with **school and family work**, because that is what a 13-year-old has.
4. It never says “hard worker,” “responsible,” or “team player.” It shows those things instead.
5. The summary line says what kind of work, not what kind of person.
6. The languages section is there, and it is the section most students forget.

Teacher key

There are no right answers on page 2. The checks are structural.

Conference script, two minutes per student, in this order, every time:

1. “Read me your summary line.” (Listen for a kind of work, not a trait.)
2. Pick the weakest bullet yourself. Do not ask them to pick it.
3. Ask the three questions: **How many? For whom? What came out of it?**
4. “Say the fixed bullet out loud.” Then: “Write it.”
5. Next student.

Conference codes for the class list:

- **S** the structure is there and the bullets have all three parts.
- **P** the structure is there but two or more bullets are missing the output.
- **N** the page has fewer than four real bullets.

Students coded **N** get the first conferences in Lesson 7.3’s pair round and a partially completed template with two bullets pre-started from their own folder.

Partner check scoring: the marked checklist is collected with the draft and scored complete, partial, or missing for daily work. A checklist counts as complete if all eight items are marked **and** the “missing part” line names an actual part (the work, the explanation, or the output). A checklist that is eight yeses with a blank missing-part line is marked partial and the pair is asked one question: “Show me the bullet with the output in it.”

What to look for when scoring Rubric 07 criterion 1 from this template:

- **Not Yet:** fewer than four sections filled, or fewer than three real bullets, or a line the student cannot point to, or the page is paragraphs.
- **Approaching:** all seven sections but three or more bullets missing the output, or no summary line, or experience lists only paid work, or bullets start with “I.”
- **Meets:** all seven sections, at least five bullets with all three parts each carrying a number or a quantity or a named audience, every line pointable, one page, no paragraphs.
- **Exceeds:** Meets plus a bullet from each of three different units, a summary naming a kind of work, and a revision the student can explain in one sentence.

On the worked example. Dev Okonkwo is fictional and must stay fictional. Do not replace this with a former student’s resume even with the name removed. If a student says “this is fake,” the honest answer is yes, and every line on it is something this class did, so check it against your own folder.

On the phone number. The example’s phone number uses the 555-01xx block, which is reserved for fiction. Tell students that putting a real phone number on a resume is a choice they should make with an adult at home, and that a school email is enough.
